July Message from the Senior Warden

July. Just can't be. Summer has barely begun, and it is flying by.

When you visit church these next couple of months you will see that Church of the Ascension is having new carpeting installed in the hallway and the church. Yes, the faded red-carpet eyesore in the church is thankfully on its way out. And the stained dirty office hallway carpeting will be gone too.

I know what you are thinking right now. I think the same thing..... "But, Susan, how can this be? You are always telling us vehemently that there is no money in the

budget for anything extra......" And believe me there is no money for anything extra. So, let's talk about this and clarify Ascension's budgeting process.

The church budget has basically three components. The first is the regular church budget which our/your pledge(s) cover. It provides for our full-time priest, pays the electric bill, and our insurance premiums as well as those other things that are considered regular maintenance.

Then the second part of our finances are what are labeled restricted funds. These funds are not a part of our budget. These funds pay for expenses beyond our ordinary expenses: the furnace acts up, a pipe busts, a tree needs to be removed or trimmed, exterior doors that need to be replaced because they are rotting and no longer latch correctly. These expenses come from restricted funds and cannot be spent unless the vestry votes on the expense with recommendations from the finance committee.

These restricted funds consist of deposits from gifts that are specified by parishioners, capital fund drives, specified fund raisers and legacy donations from parishioners who have passed away. Restricted funds are not financed by our pledges in any way. So, when those restricted funds are gone, we must develop a strategy to rebuild them.

The third part of our church finances are labeled as our endowment funds. These funds are slowly being built up in hopes that someday they will provide interest income for the church. Endowment funds cannot be spent at all. Again, pledges are not used to contribute to the endowment funds. Gifts earmarked from parishioners fund the endowment.

Last fall Carol Culp, a long-time church member passed away. She left the church a chunk of money called a legacy gift. It was part of her planned last wishes. A legacy gift usually funds the person's pledge for seven more years. This allows Ascension to adjust to an ever-changing pledge base without immediately suffering from a pledge loss upon someone's death. The remainder of the money is distributed as the parishioner has requested. In this case, as Carol Culp requested.

We are blessed by this legacy gift from Carol because the money she left to the church is helping to stabilize our pledges for the future, pay for the carpeting, rebuild our restricted fund base, and help fund our endowment. In conclusion, this is how we can move ahead on replacing our thirty-year-old carpet. The new carpeting was essentially donated as a gift to the church by a church member.

If you haven't already, please consider planning a legacy gift to church as part of your last wishes or estate. It is just another pathway to stabilizing the Church of the Ascension financially, protecting it from changes in the future.

Thank you to all of you for your pledges. For the first time in many years, we are not dependent on Diocesan funds.

Thank you, Carol, for all the gifts, time and treasures you have used to fortify our beloved Ascension.

We are thankful and prayerful for all the gifts that are given by all of us to Church of the Ascension.

A RELEVATION IN LAKEWOOD by The Rev'd Nicky Skipworth



Just as I promised Fr Vincent, I'm sat on the flight to Dublin considering how to condense the most incredible 30 days into a few hundred words.

First, though, my heart goes out to everyone who made my stay possible, no matter whether we spoke, exchanged a friendly look or spent time together for any reason. There are so many of you with Church of the Ascension I want to name, but I'm afraid I might miss someone out! I will simply say thank you, sincerely, to Fr Vincent whose willingness to have this raving extrovert under his lovely, art filled roof was an important part of my experience. I cherish our conversations and really think that he been on vacation as intended, I would have been lonely.

My aim for the middle of my sabbatical was to do something adventurous, even outlandish; some have said I'm brave, but as my husband Martin would tell you, I had to do it. Without going into unnecessary detail, it's what I desperately need right now. I also rather fancied doing something familiar in an unfamiliar place.

As it happened, Ascension became very familiar indeed. Indeed, after 22 years in ministry, I was starting to wonder whether it was possible to still be surprised, to be truly unsettled. Well, you have all given me the chance to feel this, while also making me feel safe. I love the way you love one another, and how you love the Lord. Keep on doing this, to God's glory. Carry not just the Cross but also the Incarnation, Ministry, Resurrection and, not forgetting, the Ascension of Christ in your whole self. Let us be the bearers of God together, albeit in different parts of the Anglican Communion. But what is the Atlantic when we have prayer...and Facebook!!!

On the subject of Ascension, what have I learned from you about it? If you recall my Spires article earlier this year, you'll know I've already done a lot of thinking about it. I value it as part of the Resurrection narrative because just as the disciples get cosy looking up to Heaven, they are called upon by an angel to get their noses down and hurry to Jerusalem. For me, it means I am constantly called to refocus on people and wider Creation who, along with me, bear the image and likeness of God. We do so, not only on the mountain top where the air is thin and few people inhabit, but in the valley as well. In fact, I think mostly in the valley. The valley where there is, yes, the shadow of death, but also life in all its fullness and everything in between.

I'll admit that my four or so weeks with you all has felt like a bit of a personal mountain top only, happily, with an unbiblically large number of people to keep me company! The air hasn't been terribly thin, but thick with the fragrance of friendship, kindness, Peonies, Roses, Hospitality, fresh plasterwork and that lovely, new church carpet! Let's forget the smoke wafting over Lake Erie for now.

But my time in Lakewood began at Centering Space, in the company of Sr Carol, Betsy and their small team. This gorgeous house put up with me for the first week or so and was truly a piece of Heaven on Earth. And why shouldn't it be? For Ascension is about the things of Heaven breaking forth upon the Earth. Within the generous economy of God, where God seems to reinvent their divine presence to keep us from loneliness, nothing can ever be the same again.

Sat here, tears in my eyes (again) and snuggled in the beautiful Shawl you presented to me on Sunday, I know this to be true. Thank you so very much for being my 'angel unaware' on the mountain top and in the valley, calling me to refocus and walk forward into my future without shame and whatever else I must leave behind.

I hope, most sincerely, to return next year with my family. If you think I'm trouble....

At the beginning of June, we celebrated Trinity Sunday. Every year I always go back and watch a humorous video entitled "Saint Patrick's Bad Analogies," in which a cartoon Saint Patrick attempts to explain to two Irish peasants the concept of the Trinity—except he keeps stumbling into heresies at every turn. The supposedly uneducated peasants keep calling him out until he's forced to admit that the Trinity is a mystery we can't explain with simple analogies or logic.

I used to be the kind of person who needed very clear and certain doctrinal beliefs in order to feel secure in my faith. The Trinity is a minefield for this kind of thinking! Accepting that there are some things that can't be understood by drawing a handy diagram is part of leaning into the "great mystery of faith." This doesn't mean we can turn off our brains and stop thinking about those things; it just means that wrestling with big

theological questions will often be its own reward.

FARM SUPPERS AT BELLWETHER FARM August 8th, 9th, 22nd, and 23rd

Enjoy a farm-to-table meal at Bellwether Farm. There will be four evenings offered that will provide a wonderful supper that has been creatively and freshly prepared. Participants may select which date works best

These events are by reservation only and are \$40 per person, or \$150 for a reservation of four.

SUMMER CAMP AT BELLWETHER

Each Bellwether Farm Summer Camp is a small, weeklong camp centered on the beauty of all things great and small. Campers participate in a variety of activities stemming from and connected to our farm, fields, and forests. Activities include animal time with goats, sheep, chickens and more, foraging, creeking, swimming, reading, singing, cooking, hiking, fishing, farming, canoeing, archery, and arts and crafts. Reflection, prayer, and discussion are also incorporated into the day-to-day life of the community. Campers will reside in cabins with up to 8 campers and 2 counselors, organized by age and gender identity. Bathhouses are a short walk away. All meals are farm-to-table and emphasize the connection of our bodies to God's creation.

A Mini Camp is offered to rising 2nd and 3rd graders as a "taste" of weeklong camp. Mini-campers will be integrated into the life of the camp starting Sunday afternoon, and depart on Tuesday evening.

Specialty Camps include all traditional camp activities in addition to a focus on specialty subjects that integrate into the life of Bellwether Farm.

Theater Camp will emphasize the dramatic and spoken word as powerful forms of meaning and self expression. Campers will practice storytelling, poetry, and script reading, as well as other thespian activities. The community will also develop and create a show, culminating in a final performance. This camp is focused on finding meaning in the written word and finding the voice and confidence to express it.

Music and Visual Arts Camp will incorporate choral singing, vocal exercises, percussion instruments, and other musical activities. No experience is required, although if you play an instrument, you will be welcome to bring it. Campers will also participate in creating nature art inspired by the landscape, including weaving, print-making, painting, and collage. This camp is focused on finding fun in musical and artistic community, as well as building understanding, skill, and self expression.
