These are nothing new, as they were installed last spring, but the signs on them are recent! One of my very last projects at Ascension was establishing a partnership between the church and Pet's General Store. They have given us a substantial discount on their bags in exchange for advertisement. This partnership will allow us to keep the stations stocked at a low cost, while also supporting a local, family-owned business.

The purpose of the dog bag stations is twofold: first, to help keep our garden areas clean! And second, they signal to passers-by that people from the community are free and welcome to walk, bring their dogs, and enjoy our space. Love Thy Neighbor Part 2

The following houses and people were all neighbors at one time of the Church of the Ascension and all had a connection to our parish. Many of their stories are part of our history, which has never been written and for posterity will now be explained. Unfortunately, not one of the homes in this month's article have survived what some people call progress.



13105 Detroit - Cotabish House – The Cotabish family moved to Lakewood in 1892. Sabina Cotabish, widow with eight children moved near Ascension, where she and her children would stay together for many decades building homes near each other or living as adults together. At the corner of Cohasset Avenue and Detroit was the house of Nelson Cotabish, a sales manager of National Carbon Company who was later Mayor of Lakewood (first mayor of Lakewood as a city-formerly hamlet and then village). Because of his appreciation of architecture and natural beauty, he chose to name Cohasset Avenue after the New England city of Cohassett, Massachusetts. The Cotabish family was at an Ascension wedding

in 1910 for John R. Cotabish, brother of Nelson Cotabish. The daughter of Nelson Cotabish, Vida, is found in multiple articles about fundraisers for Ascension. Her infamous dance skills were used at events to raise money for the new church prior to 1916. The Cotabish home was located where one finds Drug Mart today.









Gertrude Weaver Crider

Tuttle Weaver lived with their three children and Ella's mother, Mary Tuttle, at 13205 Detroit. The three-generation household was all involved with the Church of the Ascension. Mary Tuttle and her daughter were both very involved with fundraising for the church and were often found in the society columns of the papers for their philanthropic deeds. Both of Ella and William P. Weaver's children married at Ascension. In 1904 three generations of this family are found on a marriage record for the wedding of Gertrude Weaver to John Crider. Her parents and grandmother were listed as witnesses. Their other child Orrin married Madeline Killius in 1919 at Ascension. In 1918, when the new brick church was completed, parishioners were able to see and enjoy the beautiful altar rail in the chapel which was donated by Ella Weaver in memory of her mother, who passed away in 1910. Gertrude Weaver Crider and her husband John built a beautiful home on the Lake here in Lakewood and continued for many years to be part of the Ascension community. The Norton family later sold their home to the Saxton family, which they used as their residence. The Saxtons later had the house torn down to use the space for parking for their funeral home, which was next door.



13215 Detroit - Norton House-This house was built in 1908 for Joseph Norton and his family. This brick house was designed by architect H. A. Cone and had an approximate building cost of \$18,000 at the time. Joseph Norton and his brother-in-law, founded the Theurer-Norton Provision Company which was one of the largest meat packing companies in Cleveland. Both the Norton family and the Theurer families for generations were connected to the Church of the Ascension. Baptisms, weddings and funerals of their families are found in our records. The Theurer family is also responsible for

several stained-glass windows. This house was sold by the Norton family to the Saxton family in 1924 when it would become known as the Saxton Funeral Home.

Frank Saxton and his wife Eva Coe Saxton purchased the Norton house, which provided a beautiful and dignified setting for funerals. The beautiful stained-glass windows, organ and fine woodwork made for elegant parlors for many services. With a funeral home directly across the street from the church, it was almost understood that most of the parish used Saxton Funeral Home for their family members. Likewise, the Saxton family was very active in the Ascension community. Eva Coe, who came from a family of piano builders, was classically trained and was often found walking across the street to Ascension to play at memorial services at the church or to fill in at a moment's notice if the church's organist was unavailable. Frank and Eva's son Edward and his wife Harlene, known as "Harkie" were members of Ascension, where he served on vestry for years. Their sons Harlan and Ed Saxton both were part of the Ascension community as acolytes and later both married at the church. The Saxton family later sold the funeral home, which became a car dealership and later demolished for the building of the store one finds in that location today.



13315 Detroit- Foran House- As one crosses over Clarence Avenue, which was named for Clarence Nicholson, one finds today the immense facility called Ennis Court. If one looks at the picture of the Foran House, which stood in the same location, perhaps some of the architectural elements were inspiration for the design for the nursing home. Martin Ambrose Foran, a veteran of the Civil War, later became an attorney in Cleveland in the 1880s. He later served three terms as a Congressman from 1883 to 1888, when he returned to Cleveland and continued practicing law. As a widower with children, Martin married Emma Kenney in 1893. Not only did the Foran family become part of

the community at Ascension but Emma is found in the society pages of the Plain Dealer as a patroness in 1902 at a charity party where all proceeds were given to the church. In 1910, while living at 13315 Detroit, Martin was elected as a judge of common pleas, a position he enjoyed until his death in 1921. The house was later torn down for the building of a nursing home.

The next house would be the Nicholson House on Detroit, which has a long historic connection to the Church of the Ascension. The house and the family's connections to the church will be described in the Spires article in August.

THE GENERAL CONVENTION

Father Vincent is a Deputy to The General Convention in Louisville, Kentucky.

The General Convention is the governing body of <u>The Episcopal Church</u>. Every three years it meets as a bicameral legislature composed of deputies and bishops from each diocese.

There are two legislative Houses of the General Convention: the House of Deputies and the House of Bishops. Each of the two Houses has a presiding officer: the Presiding Bishop and the President of the House of Deputies. When there is a joint meeting of the two Houses, the Presiding Bishop has the right to preside.

The House of Deputies is composed of deputations elected from each diocese of The Episcopal Church; from Navajoland; from the Convocation of Episcopal Churches in Europe; and from Liberia (which has seat and voice). Deputations may include up to four clergy and four lay members. Members of the Official Youth Presence also have a seat and voice in the House of Deputies.

The House of Bishops is composed of every bishop of The Episcopal Church with jurisdiction; every bishop coadjutor; every bishop suffragan; every assistant bishop; and every bishop "who by reason of advanced age or bodily infirmity, or who, under an election to an office created by the General Convention, or for reasons of mission strategy determined by action of the General Convention or the House of Bishops, has resigned a jurisdiction."

The General Convention acts through the adoption of resolutions. A resolution becomes an Act of Convention only after both Houses adopt it in the same form and at the same General Convention meeting.
