It takes many different teams to keep the church on the tracks, some directly involved in our liturgical experience and spiritual growth, and others tending to the very real needs of the congregation outside spiritual realm, with the buildings, grounds, and other areas.

Recently, we had a check stolen and recreated by forgers. They attempted to steal tens of thousands of dollars using a counterfeit check. The check looked very real and included a very real looking forgery of my signature. Had the check cleared, it would have cleaned out one of the accounts and left us with an overdraft fee and with no chance to recover the stolen money. They would have been successful but for Rincy Isaacs, our Treasurer, who spotted the attempt and immediately put a stop payment on it. Our banker told me that if the check wasn't caught within 24 hours, the payment would have gone through and we would have lost the money.

This is yet another reminder that our church is living in the real world. Real-life experiences come in many forms, some joyful and some, well, not so joyful. But they're all part of life and life in a spiritual community. Handling these real-life issues is not easy and it takes dedicated teams, many of them, to navigate. As conscientious fiscal stewards and with encouragement from the bank, we moved our checking into a more secure type of account. It's more expensive and the process to approve payments is more time-consuming, but it should insulate us from these types of fraud.

There are countless acts of service behind the scenes that make parish life possible and most, like checks to keep the lights on, go unnoticed. While the physical grounds, buildings, and bank accounts are not the church - WE are the church! - The means to support our spiritual journeys need care and tending, sometimes on a daily basis. Thank you to everyone who keeps the church moving forward by answering the phone, printing the bulletins, hosting hospitality, or reviewing each transaction on our accounts.

If you have an interest in joining one of the groups that keep the church moving forward, let me or Fr. Vincent know. There are plenty of opportunities to put your skills to good use.

All roads lead to Ascension

This is the first of three articles about streets in our community, which have names connected to families that were (or are) connected to the parish at Church of the Ascension.

Coutant family

Coutant Avenue- The Coutant Avenue, found on the eastern part of Lakewood, was named for the Coutant family who had a farm in that location. Benjamin W. Coutant and Sarah Jane Townsend married on April 19, 1855. Prior to 1870, they moved to Lakewood, where they built a home on Detroit Avenue (formerly known as the Plank Road). Their home was across the street from the Hird family estate. This farming family, was known for their dedication to religion. In 1875, Benjamin's signature is found on a document in our church's archive with his pledge of a monetary gift to help build the original church. Benjamin Coutant is also found as a treasurer on vestry in the 1880s and 1890s. Sarah Coutant was notorious for teaching Sunday school for Ascension's children. The Coutants later taught Sunday school from their our home.

Nicholson family

The Nicholson Family can be traced back to James and Betsey Nicholson, who came to Rockport in 1818. Their original home no longer exists, but their home, later built in 1835 still stands on Detroit and is known as the Nicholson House by the Lakewood Historical Society. They had four children who lived to adulthood: Delia, Melissa, Lewis and Ezra. Their youngest son, Ezra, with his wife and children remained in the house on Detroit. Ezra was known for his invention of the Nicholson Self Recording Ship Log and Speed Indicator. It was with the addition of grape vineyards and fruit trees on his massive estate, that Lakewood became famous for fruit production. He is also remembered in Lakewood for the development of his land with his children, creating the streets which still to this day bear the names of his three children: Lewis, Clarence and Grace. Before the building of an Episcopal church, the Nicholson family often hosted prayer meetings at their home on Detroit, which at the time was known as the Plank Road. In 1875, Ezra Nicholson and

his wife Alice Fowles donated money toward the building of the original Church of the Ascension. In early records of the church, the burial of Asa Fowles, father of Alice Nicholson is found in the parish records. Each of the Nicholson children had a connection at the church. Lewis played the violin at many church services. Clarence and his wife, had their children baptized at the church. Grace was on altar guild, taught Sunday school and had her wedding performed by the minister from Ascension at her family home. Alice Nicholson and her sister-in-law, Arminda Nicholson, both were instrumental in fundraising for the original rectory of the church, which was built in 1892. The wife of Ezra Nicholson, Alice, and the wife of Ezra's older brother Lewis, Arminda, are both found on a list of women who were in the Ladies Guild. The historic Nicholson House was often used by the Church of the Ascension for luncheons, card parties, progressive dinners and exhibits, all hosted by the Nicholson family as patrons to the church.

Winton family

The Winton family became famous not just in the Lakewood community but throughout the country with the manufacturing of the Winton Automobile. The Winton Motor Carriage Company was founded in Cleveland in 1897 by Alexander Winton, a Scottish-born businessman and designer of bicycles, automobiles and diesel engines. Winton famously challenged Henry Ford to a race in 1901, which unfortunately (for Winton), he lost. The Winton family had a large estate on Lake Ave, which was torn down and is the location of the Winton Place found on the Gold Coast here in Lakewood. On September 12, 1925, Alexander Winton Jr. and Dorothy Gast married at Church of the Ascension with Rev. Wallace M. Gordon presiding.

Winton Avenue and the Winton Place remember the Winton family.

Jared Potter Kirtland

Margaret Manor Butler, who was instrumental in the founding of the Lakewood Historical Society described Jared Potter Kirtland as "Lakewood's most illustrious citizen of the 19th century, a naturalist, doctor, legislator, teacher and writer." As a young man Jared studied medicine in Philadelphia and for many years was a country doctor. He had a true love of nature and throughout his life collected, studied and taught others about both flora and fauna. Around 1837, he purchased land in Rockport, where he built his home near what is now the intersection of Bunts and Detroit. (Bunts Road was during this time a small lane that ran through his farm and was originally known as Kirtland Lane). He shared his love of nature with many throughout the Lakewood community. Farmers learned how to cultivate grapes, strawberries, fruit trees and more

because of the knowledge Dr. Kirtland shared. It was in 1839 that Jared Potter Kirtland began construction of his much beloved home named "Whippoorwill". This home was surrounded by exotic flowers, shrubs and trees from Europe and Asia. His collection was so famous that scientists and celebrities came to visit. In 1875, Jared Potter Kirtland and his daughter, Mary Kirtland Pease, both pledged money toward the building of the Church of the Ascension. The records of the church show that his granddaughter, Caroline Atwater Cutter, along with three of her children belonged to Ascension.

Although his house was torn down in 1953 to make room for Krogers, a local grocery store, his name lives on in many ways in and outside of the Lakewood community.

Whippoorwill Avenue was named after his beloved home. Kirtland Lane, named for him, is found north of Edgewater Kirtland and Kirtland Hills were also named after Jared Potter Kirtland.

Since this is the last period in my life when I will be able to visit new churches whenever I choose, I'm taking this time to get to know the diversity of parishes in the New Haven area. Last week's church was a reminder of the dramatic differences we hold under the "Big Tent" in the Episcopal Church. This was the "lowest" Episcopal parish I've ever been to--no acolytes, no choir, no organist, and for the moment, no priest! Right after the Prayers of the People, we had a time for folks to say their prayers aloud. This shouldn't be too unfamiliar, but when it does happen, what I'm used to is a few people quietly murmuring the names of the people they're praying for. Here, a few people actually voiced extended personal prayers, letting the congregation into their own prayer lives. After that, we had about two minutes of silent prayer just between us and God. It was a wonderful reminder that we can use some of the flexibility of our collective liturgy to edify our own personal relationships with God. And while I love organ music and incense as much as the next high church seminarian, I wouldn't say no to going back now and then.
