A couple weeks ago, during our daily worship in Marquand (the ecumenical chapel at Yale Divinity) we sang "Be Thou My Vision," and it struck me as it never had before. I must admit, I got a little misty-eyed at the line, "Heart of my own heart," and I couldn't finish singing the verse. In the same hymn, we call God "High King of heaven" and "Ruler of all." Isn't it ridiculous that we're asking the high king of heaven to be the heart of our own heart? Or that I should ask the ruler of all to be my vision? All roads lead to Ascension (Part 2)

This is the second of three articles about streets in Lakewood that have a connection to the families that did or do go to Church of the Ascension.

In 1875 a list of people pledged money for the building of the original wooden church, known to people as Church of the Ascension or Ascension Chapel. One of these people was James T. Newman and his wife, Eliza. Mr. Newman came as a child from London, England. James married Eliza Armstrong in 1854. He and his wife were pioneers of Lakewood, where they owned a track of land and home where the present-day Newman Avenue and Detroit Avenue are found. Both of their burials are found in our parish records.

Newman Avenue- Found on the east side of Lakewood was named for the Newman family.

In 1837, Joseph Hall and his wife Sarah Curtis Hall came from England and settled in Rockport with their five children. Three of the Hall brothers (Mathew, John and Curtis) and their wives were involved with Church of the Ascension.



Mathew C. Hall and his wife Margret Hall donated money towards the building of the original Church of the Ascension. The twenty-third family to be found in the church records from 1884 is the Mathew Hall family, including their two children: Ethel and Edwards. On December 3, 1896, their daughter Ethel married Dr. Albert E. McClure at the Hall family home. The minister was Rev. E. J. Craft, who worked at Ascension in its early days as a mission church.

Curtis Hall and Emma Patchen Hopkins Hall were both involved with Church of the Ascension. Emma Patchen, whose family owned and ran what would one day become The **Westlake Hotel**, did not have children of her own. As a widow, Emma married Curtis Hall, who was a widower with children from his first wife. Together they had a happy marriage and lived in

the home Curtis had built, which is still standing behind Sweet Designs (near Cranford and Detroit). Emma was the first woman found on the list of women who helped raise money for the first rectory, which was built in 1892. She was also very active in fundraising for the church along with many women who were well-known in Lakewood.

John Curtis Hall and his wife Elizabeth Maile Hall were members of Church of the Ascension along with their children Arthur and Laura. The John C. Hall and Elizabeth Maile Hall marriage was known in the Lakewood society to be that of a great love. Their admiration for each other was well-known. As a farming family, they also had the desire to have an attractive home and property, filled with attractive trees, bushes and flowers. Their home was a grand, large Victorian home, which was admired by all. John C. Hall's funeral mass was at the Hall family home and presided over by Rev. Wallace Gordon, minister from Church of the Ascension.

The Hall name is remembered in Lakewood with the street- **Hall Avenue**. The children of Mathew and Margret Hall are remembered with **Ethel Avenue**, **Edwards Avenue**, **McClure Drive** and **Edwards Park**. One can still find the carriage house from the Margaret and Mathew Hall house just north of Edwards Park.

The son of John Curtis Hall and his wife Elizabeth, Arthur W. Hall is remembered with the street- **Arthur Avenue**. Laura Hall's husband, Herbert W. Mathews helped greatly with the development of the Hall farm. Laura and Herbert Mathews are remembered with the street- **Mathews Avenue**.

Maile – In 1875, William and Alice were found among the list of those who pledged money for the original wooden building for the Church of the Ascension. A few years later the fifth wedding found in our church records is that of Christopher Maile and Mary Kidd, who married on March 1, 1883. In February 1884, William and Alice Maile were listed as our 16th family to officially join the church along with their three daughters.

The same date listed Christopher and his wife Mary along with their son, William Clifford Maile as the 17th family listed in our parish records. One of the Maile daughters, Harriett Maile married Urbane Hird- also an Ascensionite. William Maile passed away in 1919 and in 1925 Alice passed away and the last record for her is found with her burial being performed by Rev. Wallace Gordon. Their granddaughter, Lulu Maile Robinson, as an adult became part of the Ascension parish. She is remembered by some of the older parishioners. Her burial service was performed by Rev. Braun in 1971. Lulu's wedding was not at Ascension but rather in the Maile's stately brick home on Detroit- however her wedding dress from 1907 will be part of the exhibit at Ascension in 2025.

The street **Maile Avenue** was named for the Maile family and is found here in Lakewood.

Jessie Wagar Loveland and her husband, George E. Loveland along with their two daughters: Lura and Gertrude, were found in our parish records as the thirteenth family to join the Ascension community in 1881. Jessie Wagar was from one of the original families of the community. Their family home, which was built before the Civil War, stood on Detroit Avenue until 1936 when it was torn down for a local business. As a child, Jessie remembered seeing Civil War soldiers marching off to serve their country and seeing President Lincoln lay in state at Public Square on its way to burial in Illinois. George E. Loveland was on vestry at Church of the Ascension for many years starting in 1892 and was Senior Warden from 1895 until 1897. Jessie Wagar Loveland is also found in a list of women, who in 1892 were instrumental in raising the funds needed to provide the very first rectory for Church of the Ascension.

Wagar Avenue and **Mars Avenue** (named for the grandfather of Jessie Wagar Loveland) both are remembrances of the family and history that Jessie Wagar Loveland's family had in Rockport and Lakewood.



Collins French

Andrews – The twenty-second family listed in our parish records is that of the French and Andrews family. Mr. French, known as Collins French became officially a member of Church of the Ascension in 1884. His adopted daughter and her family are listed along with his name. Virginia "Jennie" French Andrews and her husband, Edwin R. Andrews with their children Jay, Frank, George, baby Edwin along with one of Virginia's sisters. That same year, Edwin Ruthven Andrews, a Civil War veteran, is found again in the church's records with his death listed as the age of 39 of heart disease (his actual age was 41). His burial is listed as being on the Andrew's family farm (he was later moved to Lake View Cemetery). Both Jennie Andrews and her daughter-in-law Lillian

Spoor Andrews (wife of Jay Andrews), were part of the Ladies Guild at Ascension and helped raise money for the original rectory. Many of the Andrews family members had connections to Church of the Ascension for years. In 1926, Virginia Harron French Andrews passed away. Her service was found at Ascension.

Her name lives on in Lakewood with the streets **Virginia Avenue**, **French Avenue** and **Andrews Avenue** which are found on what was once her family farm.

It should be mentioned that several of the women that were mentioned in this article had recipes that either have been shared with Church of the Ascension recently or had recipes that were found in the archives of the church. The recipes, along with pictures and biographies, will be available in 2025 in a celebratory collection of recipes from 1875 to the present.

A NOTE FROM OUR PARISH SECRETARY

I have been serving in the office since January 4, 2018. Over time the volunteer role I fill in the office has evolved. Back in January of 2018 I unlocked and opened the building, answered the phone, and sorted through the mail. As time went on Father Vincent asked me to schedule the Acolytes, Readers, and Ushers for Sunday Services. In January 2021 Deborah Bethea retired from serving as the other volunteer receptionist and Father Vincent asked me if I was willing to take on more responsibilities; I then became the Parish Secretary. My duties included ordering materials for adult formation classes, scheduling meetings, maintaining a calendar of all events that happen inside our building or on our grounds, sending communications on Father Vincent's behalf, and keeping all Canonical records. The Canonical records include Baptisms, Confirmations, Receptions, Reaffirmations, Marriages, and Burials in our Church. I record all the details including the attendance numbers for our Services. These records were kept in physical books but being blind I could not perform those tasks. Father Vincent asked me to create record keeping software. With his oversight I created a system that not only allows me to keep the records, but because of the standardized format they are more legible and are readily sharable with the Diocesan Office and Denominational Church; bringing the office into the 21st century.

As our Parish continues to grow so do the responsibilities of the Secretary. Father Vincent wants to evolve the position of Secretary into an Office Administrator. The new role will add the duties of making sure the office is properly stocked, and that required annual inspections are scheduled. These include security/fire system, elevator, boiler, and fire extinguisher inspections. Also, the Office Administrator will make sure that annual roof and exterior brick and tuck-pointing inspections get scheduled and organize contracts/leases, along with other duties.

As our Church has grown over the years so have the responsibilities of the Parish Secretary and this position has evolved from a volunteer position to one that should be a paid position. Father Vincent has asked the Finance Committee and Vestry to add this part time paid position to the 2025 Parish budget.
