Wow, here we are, 2025! We have been preparing for our sesquicentennial year for quite some time and as the oldest continuing congregation in Lakewood, we have a lot to celebrate. 150 years of ministry and going strong. Please plan on attending our annual meeting on Sunday January 19th to hear more about all that has been accomplished and all that is planned for the coming year. There will be one service at 10:30 am on January 19th followed by lunch and the meeting. The meeting will end no later than 2:30pm.



It is important not only look to the past as we celebrate, but to grow in the here and now in our faith and spiritual life. In the prayer for the Church of the Ascension we

pray, "Grant that we may continually grow in our own knowledge and love of you..." We will begin the year with several opportunities to grow in our knowledge and love of God and to grow in our faith as followers of Jesus who are Episcopalians.

We will resume viewing and discussing *The Chosen*, the drama series about Jesus and his movement. We will begin season 3 episode 1 on Thursday January 16th at 6pm. Our discussions include analyzing and dissecting each episode and also referring to the scriptures to see what is actually contained in the Bible and what is the author's use of imagination and poetic license. All are welcome to join. If you can watch the first two seasons before starting the class that will be helpful to you, but if not, you can dive right in with us into season 3.

Beginning on Sunday January 26th Keira Dodd will lead a 9 week Bible class on an overview of Wisdom Literature and a closer study of Ecclesiastes, Song of Songs, and Sirach. The study will take place in Ascension Hall between services from 9:15-10am. Further details will be available in the weekly bulletins.

Father Vincent and Aaron Beatty will lead a book study of *Inwardly Digest* by Derek Olsen 6:30-8pm for 9 weeks on Wednesdays beginning February 5th and ending April 16th. Although we don't begin until February, I wanted to encourage you to review or read the book, Walk in Love and (re)acquaint yourself with The Book of Common Prayer during the month of January. Both are available for purchase in the office for \$20.00. Please see Jim Weiss, our parish administrator. Also available for purchase in the office for \$20.00 is Inwardly Digest. You can get a head start on reading as we will move through the book a chapter or two a week once the class begins. Please sign up in the office if you intend on joining the class.

I am excited to begin our celebration year with ample opportunities to go deeper in our knowledge of who we are and what we believe as we celebrate the ministry we do in the name of Jesus Christ. And as a way to help us faithfully pave the way for the next 50 years of ministry as the Church of the Ascension.

Happy New Year! This year marks our Sesquicentennial Anniversary (150 Years!) and we have a lot of events to commemorate it. But first, we should quickly look back at the year that was.

We continued serving food for anyone who came to our community meals, Frankfurter Fridays, and parish dinners. Food is a bedrock material to Church of the Ascension and we continue to build community by opening our arms and hearts to anyone who steps in. We also continued our traditional events, including Ascension Market, the Car Show, Frankfurter Friday and the Cookie Walk, while beginning another with the Winter Market. We also welcomed another musical "voice" at our Lessons and Carols service with an Aaron Beatty trumpet accompaniment.

Not that we needed it, but Mother Nature reminded us of our fragility with a powerful storm that tore down several trees on our grounds. We were also given a glimpse of divine beauty with a total solar eclipse.

Looking forward, this anniversary year promises to be exciting. We have many events lined up. You can see a list of the events and dates at https://www.150years.org/. Stay tuned to Spires and the bulletin for reminders of activities as those times grow near.

We are working in conjunction with many groups, including the Lakewood Historical Society, to bring a wide variety of programming and events. We start the events with fresh look at an old favorite: a Valentine's Tea. This tea takes place February 15th. Contact Dolly Doyle for information.

In March, two speakers have agreed to offer guest lectures, and one will conclude with a supper; June marks our Sacred Moments exhibit, which will display gowns and other clothing items with links to Ascension in the undercroft. The exhibit runs through July.

We're inviting former parishioners, including those who are out of state and any others with a connection to COTA, to join us in July. In a very special weekend (July 26,27), we'll be taking a tour of the Oldest Stone House, having a History luncheon at the Nicholson House, a banquet, and a Festive Eucharist with Bishop Anne Jolly. While we celebrate the history of the Church of the Ascension, it's only natural that our celebrations include Lakewood. Our congregation makes up the oldest practicing church in the city and the history of COTA is literally written in the streets of Lakewood.

Another special event will hosting Evensong for our mother church, Trinity Cathedral. Evensong, also known as vespers, focuses on singing psalms and other biblical canticles. This event starts at 4pm. We are grateful that Trinity Cathedral is holding this special service in our church.

Our final special event is a costume party (adults only, please) on Saturday, October 25, from 6-11pm in the Hildebrandt Building. We will kick up our heels at this fundraiser, drawing in people from our congregation and beyond to relax with a Halloween Party.

All this, plus our "normal" routine of Frankfurter Fridays, markets, Car Show, holiday dinners, and Christmas activities. It truly will be a year to remember. Of course, to make these events successful, we need YOU. We need everyone to show up to help celebrate our year. There are a lot of different things to do so there is bound to be events that are appealing. For many of these events, we'll also need people to help. The only way these events can be successful is through the commitment of the congregation. As these events draw closer, please consider either joining in the fun and/or volunteering your talents. A Firm Foundation

In Matthew 7:24-27

Jesus states that those who hear His words AND do them are wise builders. They have built their homes on rock-solid foundations.

When we look at Church of the Ascension, we see beautiful lawns, brick and stonework, stained glass windows and the amazing artistry of carved wood that comprises our pews, pulpit and much more. Who were the people or companies that created the parts that now are (or once were) Church of the Ascension? We often forget the huge sacrifices that previous generations made to provide the amazing works of art. We forget the time that was spent saving funds or fundraising to provide what we see every week. In today's world, would any of us be able to recreate these items?

Builder of wooden chapel and later brick church





In 1875 after years of having church meetings in the homes of various parishioners like the Nicholson family and Hird family, a list of people was comprised that would pledge money for the building of the original church. The builder of the original church was George Chrisford. He was born in Sussex, England in 1824 and came to this country in the 1870s. After the building of the wooden chapel, which would become Church of the Ascension, there are no more records of him. His son, James, came to this country in 1884 and served his country in the Spanish American War. He was a very active member of the Lakewood Community, being a member of City Council and for a time the Director of public works. James W. Chrisford was later hired to build (not design) during WWI the new church building for Church of the Ascension. He was known as an architect and builder of many large structures in Lakewood including the Masonic Temple and St. Peter's Episcopal Church. He took much interest in the building of the Masonic temple, where he was a member for many years along with Knights Templar. In 1929, James Chrisford passed away suddenly after a fall while at a construction site. He was survived by his wife Augusta and daughter, Charlotte

Chrisford. Both Augusta and Charlotte were very involved with helping to sell items made by individuals that were blind and selling them as fundraisers to help the Society for the Blind. Charlotte who was a dedicated parishioner at Church of the Ascension, passed away in 1975 and donated half of her estate to the parish.

Architect

John William Creswell Corbusier was chosen by the building committee to design the new church building, which was begun in 1916. In our collections, we have the architectural drawings of

the building. J. W. C. Corbusier was born in 1878 in Rochester, NY. After his marriage to Katherine LaMura Lyman, he studied in Paris at L'Ecole des Beaux Arts. He was especially passionate about gothic architecture. In 1905, he moved to Cleveland where he had a successful life as an architect. His designs are found in over thirty churches throughout the United States. He and his family moved to Hudson, Ohio, where they were involved with the First Congregational Church. It was in this church that

Corbusier, who was a talented singer, was in charge of the choir.

John William Creswell Corbusier died at the young age of 49 in 1928.

He was survived by his wife and four children.

Stained Glass Windows in the nave of the church:

Originally, Church of the Ascension had only amber-colored glass throughout the nave. These can be seen still in the doors going from the nave to the narthex. Reynolds, Francis and Rohnstock are responsible for the beautiful stained-glass windows that were added to the church. Throughout Europe, one can find plenty of examples of amazing gothic architecture, which was popular from the late 12th to the 16th century. In Europe and in America, gothic architecture had a gothic revival in the mid 19th century and a second gothic revival in the 20th century. It was this second revival that influenced the work of Reynolds, Francis and Rohnstock. Many of the gothic windows found in Europe from the 13th Century became inspiration for this company. They used colors of windows in ancient churches as a guide for their new creations. Their windows are found in Paris, France and throughout the country in: Boston, at Princeton University, New York City, Pittsburgh, and Lakewood, Ohio.

Winterich is a company that was founded in 1913 by John W. Winterich, whose father was a sculpter in Germany. John Winterich showed his artistic ability in the production of stained glass, carved wood and marble. It was later taken over by his son, Otto Winterich. Otto served in WWII and married Ruth. Together they had six children. While being active

in the company, Winterich produced artforms for the Justice Center in Cleveland, Great Northern Mall, the AirForce Academy in Colorado, for the Seattle World's Fair and for Church of the Ascension in Lakewood, Ohio. In the early years of the 1970s, Winterich was approached to create panels for the front doors of Ascension. An entirely different technique and look was used because of the need for stability and the possible wear the windows might endure from use. Winterich was then asked to help design and create windows for the narthex or "porch" of the church. The Women of the Bible windows were created and dedicated in 1986. A rood beam was designed by The Winterich Company and installed in 1964. It was later removed so that the view of an added rose window over the altar in the 1980s would not be obstructed. The rood beam with the carved inscription of "I AM THE RESURECTION AND THE LIFE" was moved to the back of the church where it is enjoyed today. In 1987 Winterich created the large Rose window for over the high altar. They created an artificial

window that had electric light, creating the illusion of a true window, which for structural reasons was not feasible. Finally, Winterich was hired to create the columbarium which is found in the chapel and the narthex.

Wood-workings, carvings, handcrafted artistry



Theodor Kundtz

Theodor Kundtz was born July 1, 1852 in Metzenseifen, a town in what was the Austro-Hungarian Empire. As a young man he learned woodworking from his father before immigrating to America in 1873. Five years later, Theodor Kundtz created The Theodor Kundtz Company. His company was known for creating wooden bodies for early automobiles, the bodies for White Sewing machines, seating for theaters, desks and seats for schools and creating pews and altars for churches. When Church of the Ascension was building their new structure in 1916, they ordered pews and much more from the Kundtz company. The hand-carved artistry found on the chapel altar, altar rails, sedilia, bishop's chair, lectern and pulpit are wonderful examples of the quality of work that churches throughout the country now

boast of having. Trinity Cathedral in Cleveland, cathedral of the diocese of Ohio, also has pews from the Kundtz company.

Theodor married Maria Ballash and had ten children together. Theodor was known for being involved with not only his companies but being on the boards of several banks in the Cleveland area. His wife, Maria, was active in Lakewood Society helping with philanthropic endeavors and often hosted events at the Kundtz home. Around 1900, Theodor and his wife had a magnificent house built in Lakewood on the lake. Their land went from Lake Ave. to Lake Erie. In 1902, Theodor Kundtz was knighted by Emperor Franz Joseph of Austria- Hungary. The Kundtz Castle, as it was known in Lakewood, was torn down in 1961. Some older parishioners remember seeing the Kundtz Castle from the outside or touring the inside before it was demolished.
