Walking Through Holy Week, Embracing Easter Joy, and Celebrating 150 Years of Faith

Beloved People of God,

I write to you today with a heart full of gratitude and a deep sense of our shared journey in Christ. Our lives are woven together in a tapestry of faith, hope, and love, nurtured and strengthened through our participation in worship and our ongoing spiritual development. In March, our year-long celebration continued with the first of our speaker series. Dr. Robert Shimp, the director of the Lakewood Historical Society presented a talk entitled "Church of the Ascension 150: A Rockport Township and Lakewood Retrospective to a crowd of more than 80 people. Rockport, from which Lakewood and surrounding areas were carved, was an area in transition as the city of Cleveland grew and people flocked westward.

The roots of Rockport grew both the city of Lakewood and the Church of the Ascension. The people of Church of the Ascension were instrumental in building Lakewood, the city of Cleveland, and beyond. Our archivist and vestry member Greg Sent followed Dr. Shimp

with a presentation of his own. While he definitely didn't dwell on how many Lakewood streets were named after Ascensionites (ahem), he was able to show how these early pioneers brought our church to life and gave definition to Lakewood. The plots of land that once held prominent orchards and gardens gave way to streets and neighborhoods still bearing the names of these early parishioners.

The second speaker, Rev. Dr. Wilbert spoke of "Bishops, Buildings, and the Broad Work of the Church" to a crowd of more than 50 people following the 10:30am service. His talk presented a historical picture of the wider area, the people who were important at the start of the Church of the Ascension, and the work they did outside of our church. In those days, the land was rugged and so were the pioneers who settled it. Rev. Wilbert is an engaging speaker and everyone enjoyed his stories of these pioneers.

If you missed one or both of the presentations, or you want to watch them again, the sessions were recorded and available on our YouTube page.

We had our inaugural Yoga class, which is a meditational class rooted in connecting our bodies with the Holy Spirit. Some people used mats, some used chairs, but all were able to use their bodies to make a deeper connection with the Spirit. This class is open to all and accommodations are made no matter your physical condition. A free-will offering is available.

Just a couple of weeks left for our Lenten Fish Fry (there won't be a fry on Good Friday). It's been years since the church had a fish fry and I'm curious what you think about the reintroduced version. Please stop me and let me know what you think! Your opinion will help shape future events.

This parish continues to be full of surprises. One thing I've observed recently is the remarkable flexibility of our community members. Time and again, I've witnessed this adaptability, especially as we navigate our anniversary year, liturgical seasons, and various recurring events that overlap on the calendar. Our collective and individual capacity to embrace change is truly a blessing. From spur of the moment prayer-leading to changing cleaning schedules based on our growing list of activities, we have a dedicated group who are willing to tackle what needs to be done. With all the events we have lined up this year, there are a lot of chances to help make these events go smoothly. I hope you'll be willing to help, even if it's just for a short time.

CLARKE MORTENSEN, SEMINARIAN

One of the blessings of attending an ecumenical divinity school is the opportunity to engage with people from all sorts of different traditions. YDS's Pulpit Supply Program lets seminarians preach at churches either whose clergy are absent or who do not have a pastor. The program primarily serves United Church of Christ and American Baptist congregations. I recently preached at a small Baptist church in rural Connecticut, and when I say small, I mean it! Not counting Dani and myself, there were seven people present.

Sometimes, the students are expected to do more than just preach. For this church, I also had to lead certain prayers, including their equivalent of the Prayers of the People. Other than the Lord's Prayer, none of these were predetermined, so I got to write them (except the closing prayer, which I forgot to write, and was therefore an exercise in extemporaneous prayer). I saw this as an opportunity to look at our own resources from the prayer book and decide how to adapt them to fit the context of a tiny Baptist church. For instance, they would be awfully confused if I prayed for "all bishops and other ministers"!

This church also does not follow the lectionary, which meant that for the first time, I got to choose my own readings upon which to build my sermon. This is something that I will virtually never be able to do again once (God willing and the people consenting) I am ordained. So while I deeply appreciate the lectionary and all the gifts it gives us, this is the time to do something different. It's the time to take breaks from the broad/high church Episcopal habits I've developed, dip my toes in someone else's pond, and in doing so, become a more well-rounded minister as well as Christian.

Lost homes of Ascension Families - Part Two

Hutchinson-"North Anchorage"

Captain Charles Lorenzo Hutchinson and his wife, Jean Creech Smith, lived at 1438 Grace Avenue (originally house number 18 Grace until 1906 when addresses were changed) being just a short walk from Church of the Ascension. Captain Charles L. Hutchinson was senior member of the Hutchinson & Company and president of the Pioneer Steamship Company, which at one time had 38 ships on the Great Lakes. From 1901 until 1904, C.L. Hutchinson is found in our records as a member of the vestry. His wife, Jean, is found in various articles in the society pages of local newspapers as part of the Ladies Guilds at Church of the Ascension.

She helped raise money for the church alongside names such as Alice and Grace Nicholson, Maria Hird, Aleksandra Elliott and Ella Weaver. In 1910,

the Hutchinson family moved to a magnificent home they called "North Anchorage". The house was on a plot of land that went from Lake Avenue to the lake long before Edgewater cut through the properties. Together Captain C. L. Hutchinson and Jean C. Hutchinson had four children: John Thomas, Charles Lorenzo, William S. and Gene Creech Smith Hutchinson. Their children and many grandchildren had a connection to Ascension.

North Anchorage was the site of many fundraisers for the Lakewood Garden Club, the DAR, local hospitals and also Church of the Ascension. In the 1980s, North Anchorage was destroyed to make the land available for a development. Edgewater Lane was created with multiple homes in what was considered new, exclusive, luxury homes.

The Wagar House

Jessie Wagar Loveland and her husband, George E. Loveland along with their two daughters: Lura and Gertrude, were found in our parish records as the thirteenth family to join the Ascension community in 1881. Jessie Wagar was from one of the original families of the community. Her grandfather was Mars Wagar, for whom two streets in Lakewood were named. As a child, Jessie remembered seeing Civil War soldiers marching off to serve their country and seeing President Lincoln lay in state at Public Square on its way to burial in Illinois. George E. Loveland was on vestry at Church of the Ascension for many years starting in 1892 and was Senior Warden from 1895 until 1897. Jessie Wagar

Loveland is also found in a list of women, who in 1898 helped to raise the money needed to build the first rectory for Church of the Ascension.

After the turn of the century, Jessie, her husband and children moved to Kansas for many years. After the death of her husband and a daughter, Jessie moved back to Lakewood, where she passed away in the house where she lived as a child on Detroit Avenue on August 30, 1932. Their family home, which was built before the Civil War, stood on Detroit Avenue until 1936 when it was torn down for a local business.

The Tegardine House

Jabob E. Tegardine was a postmaster, councilman and later mayor of Lakewood. Jacob came as a one year old with his parents to Lakewood from England in 1843. He fought in the Civil War under the command of Col. Rutherford B. Hayes. It was at the intersection of Warren and Detroit that the Tegardine family had their home and a general store. Jacob and Mary Tegardine had five daughters: Mary, Isabelle, Maude, Kate and Frances. Maude was a school teacher, following in the tradition of the Wagar family, which supported education for generations in Lakewood. On February 3, 1904 Maude Tegardine married Harrison Schmidt at the Tegardine home at the southwest corner of Warren and Detroit. The minister at the wedding was Rev. George Frederic Williams, rector of Church of the Ascension. Their home was for many years used as city hall for Lakewood. In 1925, the Detroit-Warren Building at 14805 Detroit Avenue replaced the Tegardine family home.

Frederick W. Stecher and his wife Lue Morgan Stecher.... On October 30, 1895 Lue Morgan and Frederick W. Stecher were married in Cleveland, Ohio. Her husband at the time was a drug clerk who had opened a drug store in Cleveland. He later created the "Pompeiian Massage Cream", which earned him a fortune. He was known in the world of pharmacists as a hard-working and honest man. Lue and Frederick had three children: Robert, Paul and Edith. As a family, the Stechers were able to enjoy the luxury of trips abroad. In the early part of the 1900s, they purchased a large plot of land and had a grand home on Lake Erie. The yard was known for the structured hedges and lush gardens. Massive trellises were found through the paths going from the house to the cliff over the lake.

Frederick and their eldest son went on an automobile trip to Dartmouth College in 1916. Along the way, Frederick caught a cold from which he passed away on September 27, 1916. To honor her husband, Lue and her son, Dr. Robert Stecher, donated the funds for a new hand-carved, wooden pulpit for Church of the Ascension. Lue remained on Lake Ave. in the Stecher home and enjoyed the vast, beautiful gardens to host a variety of luncheons for the Lakewood League of Women Voters, Lakewood Garden Club, Women's Guild for Church of the Ascension or YWCA. She was known for her generosity to all of these causes and others. Lue was often generous but preferred anonymity for her work and monetary gifts. On August 4, 1940, Lue Morgan Stecher passed away. Her service was held at Church of the Ascension and a doorway was donated by her family to the church in her memory. She was buried with her husband and family in Lake View Cemetery.
