Thompson. And the Rev. Gregory Stark sent a message to the congregation which is included in this edition of the Spires. Bishop Arthur and Lynette Williams also joined us as well as former choir members and several other people with connections to this parish and love for our Lord.

This special day, marking our namesake, was truly a testament to God's enduring presence among us. We shared a joyful meal, followed by Holy Eucharist. The spirit of reunion filled our church, with every hug and shared story deepening our sense of gratitude for the bonds that tie us together across time and distance.

During the service, we reflected on the profound meaning of the Ascension of Jesus, the very event our parish is named for. Far from being a departure, the Ascension is a radical transformation of presence. Jesus brings his risen and scarred body – a body that bore the wounds of the cross but also the marks of resurrection and victory – into the very heart of God in heaven. This powerful image reminds us that our own humanity, complete with its struggles, joys, accomplishments, and losses, is not only cherished by God but is eternally united with the divine.

This understanding of the Ascension directly informs our call to be the Body of Christ in the world. Just as Jesus did not discard his wounds upon ascending but glorified them, so too are we called to bring our whole selves to ministry. Our scars, our unique journeys, our experiences – both joyful and challenging – are not hindrances but rather integral parts of who we are called to be. They are the very avenues through which we can connect with a broken world and offer God's healing love.

The Acts of the Apostles reminds us that following the Ascension, the disciples received power when the Holy Spirit came upon them, empowering them to be witnesses to the ends of the earth. We, too, are empowered by the Spirit to continue Christ's work, living out the Gospel in our daily lives. Each person gathered for our homecoming, whether a long-standing member, a returning friend, a former resident of Ascension House, or an ordained minister, embodies this call to carry Christ's presence into the world.

Our celebration underscored the truth that relationships transform us forever. The Christian life is not lived in isolation; it is a journey shared within a loving community. The countless individuals who have built and sustained Church of the Ascension for 150 years, and those who continue to do so today, have shaped us all. It is in this rich "quilt" of shared life, of supporting each other through victories and losses, that we truly grow into the vibrant, living Body of Christ.

As we look ahead, may we continue to embrace our identity as an open and affirming Episcopal Church, a place where all are welcome, where all are valued, and where all are empowered to be the Body of Christ in the world. Let us live out the truth that God is always present, especially in our wounds, and that through us, His boundless love continues to ascend into the world, transforming lives and bringing hope to all.

For the first two Sundays in June, The Rev. Valerie Hart, who grew up in this parish and was one of the clerics who joined us for Ascension Day, will be with us for Holy Eucharist. We look forward to spending time with her and hearing stories about her life at Ascension and beyond and her years as a priest. Welcome home Rev. Valerie!

On Pentecost we will celebrate the graduation of Keira Dodd from EfM. She will share with us how Church of the Ascension has helped her to find her place in the Body of Christ and has become her vehicle for building a deeper relationship with God and God's people and growing in her own spiritual life.

We continued our speaker series in May with a focus on Church of the Ascension's impact in the world with a presentation called "Henry Wood Elliott: Lakewoodite and America's First International Conservationist", given by Eva Wischhusen, who is soon-to-be graduated from Lakewood High School. This marvelous presentation highlighted the life of one of COTA's earliest members. Mr. Elliott was an international figure, whose work with seals in Alaska culminated in co-authoring the first international treaty dedicated to the conservation of wildlife. Ms. Wischhusen was very knowledgable of the subject and poised in her delivery. We thank her for the time and dedication it took to put the presentation together and deliver it. One of Mr. Elliott's daughters was married at COTA and her wedding dress will be part of the "Sacred Moments Exhibit".

As befitting our special year, this year's Ascension Day was a homecoming as former Ascensionites were invited back to share our namesake day with a dinner and a service. It was truly a special day as

we reconnected with old friends, swapped stories, and caught up. COTA is a special place for many people, even though we don't see all of them on a weekly basis. The roots of COTA run deep and wide.

And speaking of history coming home, I got a sneak peek of the Sacred Moments exhibit, which shows off sacrimental gowns (wedding dresses, suits, baptismal gowns and priest vestments) worn in ceremonies at COTA or by the people here and have come "home" for this display. A quick story: We have a wonderful relationship with our neighbor St. Ed's, whose students we provide with opportunities for needed service hours. They are a great help in keeping this place looking great, and we asked them to help clean the undercroft in preparation for this exhibit. Well, imagine my surprise when I led a group of high school boys into the undercroft which was full of naked women mannequins. Thankfully, they took it all in stride (besides a few snickers and blushes). Their chaperone also didn't seem to mind, though I noticed they didn't take many pictures of this part of the cleaning.

The mannequins are now fully clothed, and the undercroft is completely transformed into a museum quality showplace. The formal attire is lovingly and carefully presented with some of the history behind the people who wore it. It is truly an extraordinary and one-of-a-kind exhibit. Dresses and gowns from the Victorian Era onward are on display, some so delicate that moving them risked tearing them.

We received gowns and other items from Florida, Philadelphia, Texas, California and more. We have items from the diocese representing four different bishops and six different ministers connected with COTA. The oldest wedding dress comes from 1878, and you might be surprised how it looks; the oldest garment is a baptismal gown from the 1860s!

Special thanks to vestry member Greg Sent who organized this event and along with Lisa Raab, Karen Walsh, and Deb Polen, who spent long and dedicated hours contacting contributors and putting it together. The bulk of the work is done, but we still need your help to make this event a success. While the exhibit is open, we need Ascensionites to be present in the undercroft to help people find their way around and generally be available. Three volunteers are needed each Sunday in June and July from 12 pm - 3 pm. Sign-up sheets are in the office.

As we've mentioned before, there are several larger-scale projects that need attention, including elevator replacement, roof repair, and completing the organ. We are finalizing the cost for these projects and will soon be updating everyone with our final costs and plans to fix them. Stay tuned!

In June we continue our lecture series with a look back to when Ohio was a manufacturing center and Lakewood produced Templar cars. Dave Buehler will be speaking about the cars in what's sure to be an informative and interesting look into our storied past.

W. E. McLaren

William Edward McLaren (1831-1905)

William E. McLaren was born in Geneva, New York on December 15, 1831. He was the son of Rev. John Finley McLaren, a Presbyterian minister from a Scottish family. After studying at Jefferson College in Pennsylvania, William McLaren moved to Cleveland, Ohio. In Cleveland, he was editor of the Plain Dealer for years. In 1858, he longed to enter the ministry and enrolled in the Theological Seminary at Allegheny City, Pennsylvania. After being ordained in 1860, he spent two years doing missionary work in Bogota, Columbia. After years of

biblical studies and prayerful thought, Rev. William McLaren converted to the Episcopal faith in 1871. In 1872, he was ordained and the following year was

selected as rector of Trinity Cathedral in Cleveland. During his time at Trinity, he created the Trinity Children's Home and was instrumental in the creation of the Mission Church of the Ascension in Lakewood, Ohio. At this time, it was known as Ascension Chapel. Not long after, he was elected and then consecrated to the office and position of bishop of Illinois. During his time in Illinois, other dioceses were created. He remained in charge of the diocese of Chicago until his death in 1905. He was known for his work ethic and his creation of several religious books. He was survived by his wife, one son and two daughters.

He passed away on February 19, 1905 and was buried at Rosehill Cemetery in Chicago.



Rev. Wesley Brown

John Wesley Brown (1837-1900)

John Wesley Brown was born on July 7, 1837 in Baltimore, Maryland. He was the son of John Smith Brown and Sarah Harrison Brown. He was a graduate of Dickinson College and was at one time a civil engineer in the government's service. In 1860, he entered the Methodist ministry and served as a Methodist minister for five years. He then desired a more catholic and apostolic foundation and found the Episcopal faith to his liking. In 1866, he was ordained to the priesthood at St. Anne's Church in Middletown, Delaware. This was also the year he married Abigail Gambrill. As a priest and Doctor of Divinity, he was known as Dr. Brown to his parishes. He was the successor of Rev. McLaren as rector of Trinity in 1876. As part of his responsibilities, he acted as minister to the Ascension Chapel mission in Lakewood, Ohio.

In 1882, he moved to Buffalo, New York where he became rector at St. Paul's Cathedral. Six years later, he was called to New York City. Dr. Brown and his wife lived in a beautiful home on 5th Avenue in Manhattan and had the luxury of

4 servants in their home. It was Dr. Brown who performed the 1895 marriage ceremony for Consuelo Vanderbilt and the Duke of Marlborough at St. Thomas Church in Manhattan. The wedding was described by the New York Times as "the most magnificent ever celebrated in this country" with a sixty-member symphony orchestra at the ceremony.

On November 10, 1900, at the age of 63, Dr. Brown passed away. The Parish Association described him as "a man of large heart and broad sympathy which found a field in constant acts of self-denial, of charity to the poor, of comfort to the afflicted, of succor to the distressed, winning the hearts of all to whom he ministered by his kind and affable manner." Dr. Brown was buried at Woodland Cemetery in Bronx, New York.

Eliza Jennings Burton Backus

Eliza Jennings Burton Backus (1855-1953)

Eliza Jennings Burton was born September 14, 1855 in Cleveland, Ohio to Rev. Lewis Burton and Agnes Jane Wallace Burton. Her father was the famous "Apostle of the West Side", who traveled through the Cleveland area and pushed for the mission church, which would become Church of the Ascension. She was named for her mother's sister, Eliza Jennings, who gave her estate to found the Eliza Jennings Home for underprivileged children and elderly women. As a young woman, Eliza studied and was a graduate of the Cleveland Female Seminary in June 1873. After her graduation with honors, she was known to help her father with his mission work. She often traveled with him in his buggy through Rockport to visit families, help them, pray with them and learn of the community's need for a church. She remembered visiting families along the

Plank Road (now Detroit) where the large homes were set far from the street and her father's visits with Jared Potter Kirtland. After the building of Church of the Ascension, she often helped her father at the new wooden church, playing the organ when needed. It was at Church of the Ascension that she met Rev. Arthur Mann Backus, who would soon become a full-time rector at Ascension. More importantly, he would become the husband to Eliza Jennings Burton.

Rev. Arthur Mann Backus (1843-1891)

Arthur Mann Backus was born on November 17, 1843 in Troy, New York. He was a graduate of Nashotah Theological Seminary and became deacon on Ascension Day- May 30, 1875. His ordination took place in St. John's Church in Ohio City. In 1876 he advanced to priesthood. He became assistant minister to Trinity Church in Cleveland, Ohio. According to some sources he is remembered as the first official rector of Church of the Ascension. He later became rector of St. Andrew's in Elyria, Ohio.

Eliza Jennings Burton and Arthur Mann Backus married on Wednesday May 1, 1878 at noon at Trinity Church. Eliza's father, Rev. Lewis Burton performed the ceremony, assisted by the rector of the church Rev. John W. Brown. Together they had two daughters: Jean and Marjory.

After his time in Ohio, the Rev. Backus and his wife moved to Massachusetts. For nine years Rev. Backus was rector of St. Paul's in Dedham, Massachusetts. Rev. Backus was known for his love of church music and his ability to sing. It is believed that from a heroic deed of rescuing a young woman who was drowning, Rev. Arthur Backus injured his heart and for years suffered. Because of his illness, he and his family returned to Ohio where he hoped to recover. He died in Painesville, Ohio on July 18, 1891 at the age of 47. He was buried at Lake View Cemetery. Although it was a marriage that lasted only 13 years, it was remembered as a very happy marriage. Less than one year after the death of her husband, their daughter Marjory passed away at the age of seven.

A few years later, Eliza and her children moved back to Cleveland and became active at St. Paul's Episcopal Church. In 1921, she was elected president of the Women's Auxiliary of the Episcopal Diocese of Ohio. She also founded the Book of Remembrances of the Ohio Diocese, in which gifts to the diocesan churches may be recorded in the name of a relative or friend. Later in life, Eliza moved to Lakewood to live with her daughter and family. She moved back into the community where as a young woman she visited so many of the pioneer families and Church of the Ascension was a new, small church. In 1940, many of the old houses were gone, the city had grown and the church was now of brick and stone. She lived with her daughter, granddaughter and great-granddaughter- all of whom were active at Church of the Ascension.

On August 2, 1953, weeks away from turning 98, Eliza Jennings Burton Backus passed away. Retired Bishop Beverley Tucker presided over her funeral on August 4, 1953. She was buried with her husband in the Burton family plot at Lake View Cemetery.

Dear Church of the Ascension,

Nearly 12 years ago you welcomed a bright-eyed, poetry-loving 21 year old to your church picnic. He was new to Lakewood, and, while not new to church, didn't know where God was calling him. You invited him to suppers and EfM and choir. You told him your stories, shared your time and made him feel at home.

Now thousands of miles away, living in the UK that not-as-young-anymore adult is a priest and chaplain at Emmanuel College, Cambridge. The lessons you taught about what it means to be the Body of Christ have stayed with me. From Ascension in 2013-2014, I went off to Yale Divinity School (coming back for visits to Ascension and the diocese) to train for the

priesthood. I was ordained a deacon in June 2017, and a priest in December of the same year. You were like a second sponsoring parish to me. I served as curate and then associate rector at St. Andrew's, Elyria and Christ Church, Oberlin from 2017 to 2021, where I tried to practice the love you all taught me. From there I went to Belgium to pursue a research masters in theology and work for the Convocation of Episcopal Churches in Europe for two years, before moving to Cambridge in October 2023 to begin my current position. I am in my second year (of four) in my PhD in theology, examining how the literature, art, and activism around HIV/AIDS in 1980s New York City can be a resource for how we think about grief and mourning in Christian theology.

When I think about generosity, kindness, patience, and, most of all, love, I think of that year and the many years since when you demonstrated these fruits of the Spirit. Last September, when I had the privilege to spend time with many of you, I was delighted to see and celebrate how you have continued in your gift of hospitality.

On this anniversary and the celebration of the feast of the Ascension, I join with you from afar in rejoicing in how you have raised up so many into the experience of God's abiding love. This is one of the symbols, for me, of the feast of Christ's Ascension. It is not so much that he has gone up to some place far away in the heavens, but that he has gone ahead of us and promised us a place within the heart of God. As we await this promise of fulfillment, we look to one another and celebrate how God is alive and at work in our midst already.

We may be divided by time and space from those who have gone before us, but Christ has promised to send one who will comfort us, advocate for us, and accompany us in being Christ's Body in the world.

EDUCATION FOR MINISTRY
