Beloved People of God,

We begin September the day after leadership Sunday, August 31st, which featured many of our children and youth in key liturgical roles including Domenico as our preacher. If you missed it, I encourage you to go to our YouTube channel and listen to his insights and reflections as well as to the youth led voluntary and sequence hymn. We are so blessed to learn from and grow with our kids in ministry and service!

On the first two Sundays in September, the 7th and 14th we will meet between services from 9:15-10:15am in Ascension Hall to reflect on the past 150 years and to explore what God might be dreaming for this parish. moving forward. We will use our book, The History of the Church of the Ascension: 150 Years of Ministry in Lakewood, OH to look for patterns, pitfalls, strengths, charisma, and more. On September 7th we will discuss the first 64 pages and then the rest of the book on September 14th. Please make every effort to join in this important process of reflecting and dreaming. Books are available in the office for \$20.00.

On Tuesday September 9th all are invited to meet for an hour to explore our Episcopal Identity. The Ascension team who attended the College for Congregational Development at Bellwether Farm August 10th -15th will guide the activity, presentation, and discussion. There will be light refreshments, and we will end with Compline. See page 127 in The Book of Common (BCP) to find the service of Compline.

Continuing the themes of history and Episcopal identity, we will have Choral Evensong on Sunday September 21st at 4pm, followed by dinner. All are encouraged to participate in this very special gathering. In celebration of our 150th anniversary and in recognition of our interconnectedness, the dean of Trinity Cathedral will preach, the cathedral music director and choir will lead the music, and the rector of St. Peter's, Lakewood will preside. It will be beautiful and festive!

Also in September, considerably earlier than usual, we will have our pet blessing and memorial service at 10am on Saturday the 13th. At the service we begin by telling stories of our pets that died and spreading their ashes in the sacred circle in the St. Francis Garden. Then we will give thanks to God for them and for our living pets and ask God's blessing upon them and us. If you intend to spread ashes, please let Father Vincent or Jim know so we can plan accordingly. This is a great opportunity to invite other pet lovers and to offer comfort to those who may be grieving the loss of one of their furry companions.

Our 150th Celebration year reached a crescendo the last weekend in July. With all the events we had scheduled and guests (local and out of town), we were anticipating a fun and memorable weekend, but like the Sacred Moments exhibit, the events themselves transcended our most optimistic expectations.

The weekend actually started on Wednesday, when Mia Hutchinson Soosai presented a lecture on The French & Andrews Family in Lakewood History. The prominent members of COTA and early Lakewood pioneers worked a fruit farm, from Detroit Avenue (then known as Plank Road) to Lake Erie, between Andrews and Lakeland Avenues. Even in the description, it's hard to avoid streets named after them. If you've ever been on Clifton, you can see more of their namesake streets, like Virginia & French. In 1875 when our church was built, growth in Rockport Township was still gathering steam. By the end of that century, orchards and farms, like those owned by these families, were being sold to make way for the growing population.

On Friday, we held two events simultaneously. Inside the church, Jennifer Cauffield and Jeff Hutchinson presented "Rise & Fall" The Hutchinson Family of Lakewood and their Role on the Great Lakes. The Hutchinsons were another prominent family found in our record books, who played a large part in Great Lakes shipping. They introduced new concepts to shipping and weathered different economic storms. Their contribution to Great Lakes history was long and notable, as was their presence on our church's roster.

While the lecture was in full swing, Owen Jones and I were manning the grills for Frankfurter Friday. We expected a few more people than normal due to the talk, but you know what they say happens when you "assume" (ahem). While the number of people surprised me, Rob Theibert was definitely thinking ahead because we didn't run out of food for what turned out to be one of the biggest Frankfurter Fridays we've ever had. It was a joy seeing so many people rub elbows and talk. Several of the out of town guests were able to see, up close and in person, exactly what this event means to the church and the community. That evening was simply delightful.

Now it's time for a confession. I've lived less than a mile from the Old Stone House for more than 20 years. I regularly pass it walking my dog. And while I love history, I never entered the building. I'm happy that changed on Saturday morning of our big weekend. The Oldest Stone House is a Lakewood landmark. While the Historical Society has a lot of early artifacts from the time, they did not have any portraits of early occupants. That changed once Greg Sent uncovered portraits of O.W. and Isabell (née Honam) Hotchkiss, which COTA gifted to the Historical Society. The Hotchkisses helped fund construction of the original 1875 church. These portraits are now displayed prominently in the Old Stone House. If you haven't been there, it's a very interesting look into how people lived 150 years ago. The Historical Society shared a great deal of information about the house, the times in which they lived, and all sorts of stories. It was well worth the time.

Following the open house, our Saturday dive into history continued with a presentation of Ascension and Lakewood History, delivered by Dr. Robert Shimp, Director of the Lakewood Historical Society in the beautiful and historic Nicholson House. Dr. Shimp provided a wonderful overview of the people who built Lakewood up from a rural, farmstead area into the bedroom community it eventually became. As we know, Ascensionites who built our church were also instrumental in building the city, and Dr. Shimp highlighted their contributions outside the church.

The talk was followed by a luncheon, where we gathered to eat at tables in several beautiful rooms. Ann Beyer (with husband and right-hand man Bill), served a delicious lunch; we have Roger Barnhard to thank for linens and wonderful presentation. These generous acts allowed us to eat and talk about the presentation and get to know each other better. Once again, the presentation room and the luncheon rooms were filled with people. There's no doubt about it: Ascension shows up!

We capped off the day with a Festive Banquet & Presentation. We started the evening in the church, with heartfelt messages from Fr. Vincent, Greg Sent and I. Cindy Marx, the church's council representative, presented a proclamation she sponsored, in which the city officially recognized our 150th anniversary. The presentation portion was capped off with Mother Leah Romanelli-DeJesus's video she made while undergoing discernment at COTA.

After the presentations, we headed to Strom Hall for a wonderful banquet. Strom Hall looked stunning, the food was delicious, and the rest of the evening was spent in relaxed conversation. We got to know our out of town guests and each other better during the course of the evening. One thing that always amazes me about the people of Ascension is our ability to connect. We connect with familiar faces as well as new faces with equal facility. Our spirit shows when we're together. It's part of what makes us special.

On Sunday, we culminated our capstone weekend by welcoming Bishop Anne Jolly, who presided over the service. The Bishop's celebration was a wonderful way for the diocese to recognize our special year. The church was packed and the Spirit moved throughout. It was a beautiful service with a heartfelt and personal sermon. After the service, we moved to Strom Hall for hospitality, and again filled our large auditorium. It was amazing to see so many people (and again, eat such great food - thank you Stephanie Gillis and Racheal Klemola).

The weekend was absolutely amazing. Every event exceeded my expectations. From the number of people who participated to the outstanding weather to the flawless execution of each event, it was a weekend for the ages. It takes a lot of hard work and planning to deliver at a high level. Thank you to everyone who helped.

A quick note: Bishop Anne and her husband David put their vacation on hold to worship with us. They literally left hospitality and went straight to the airport to resume their vacation. Their presence helps us understand that our milestone isn't just ours; it's a tradition we share beyond our grounds and into the diocese itself. We thank her and her husband for putting their personal lives on hold for us.
























#### **GREGORY SENT, ARCHIVIST**

The following was my speech right before the banquet on July 26, 2025. It was a wonderful day with new and old friends. We had parishioners at the dinner, who come to church weekly, visitors, who grew up in the church and were "coming home" and new friends, who had perhaps never previously felt the love and community of our church.

I was asked by Father Vincent to share my words in the Spires this month for those who perhaps were unable to be with us that weekend.

For those of you who do not know me, my name is Greg Sent. I was born the year that this church celebrated its 100th anniversary. I was baptized by Rev. Braun, confirmed at the age of ten, went to Sunday School here and was often found as an acolyte with my older brother George. If you want any funny stories about me as an acolyte leading the choir out of the church and into the parking lot, ask Jon Peterson later.

As a young man I became passionate about genealogy. I remember being an insecure teen and feeling like my ancestors who had passed away, would never judge, never condemn and on the fun side... I could collect as many as I wanted! (anyone who knows me – knows I love to collect)

A few years ago, Father Vincent asked me to consider using my love of Lakewood History and my passion for genealogy and combine it to help organize the history of Church of the Ascension. I think I jump at the opportunity with a very quick YES! Together we collected anything we found that looked historic from cupboards, file cabinets, drawers in the office, and boxes in the apartment above the chapel.

I was like a kid in a candy shop. I had no idea we had such amazing images of our church or the parishioners over the years. The first thing I noticed, which was my hook to want to learn more was the fact that our church's history is Lakewood history. The pioneers of Rockport were almost all at Ascension. The streets and historic landmarks can almost all be traced back to the early days of our church. I was humbled when I looked through the parish registers and list of people who served on vestry. (Of course, in the early years they were all only men) Coal barons, industrialists during the Gilded Age, doctors, lawyers. It made me curious to learn more about the women of our church. Society pages of local newspapers helped to give an idea of the movers and shakers of the Women's Gild at Ascension, where the women put the fun in fundraising and had events nonstop.

I started this journey with history thinking that I would be mostly looking at records for people long gone. People that had been dead for decades and possibly forgotten. I wanted as many of these people remembered and their lives and contributions brought to light. What I didn't realize was how those who have passed on would push me to talk to so many living people.

With our amazing history at Church of the Ascension, we have now connected with the Lakewood Historical Society. They helped us and provided many images of former parishioners, which made their way into our bulletins and our cookbook. In return, we shared with them the original images of the pioneer family, who lived in the Oldest Stone House. Likewise, we shared images of Mr. and Mrs. West whose farm inspired the name of the suburb West Park.

We as a church built a connection with the archives of the Diocese found at Trinity Cathedral. Their archivist, Rev. Brian Wilbert took the time to help with the preservation of our records, research of many of our past clergy members and taught best practices for developing our own archive.

With all that, I felt we really were hitting just the tip of the iceberg. If you know my family, you know that tenacity is in our DNA (if you don't believe me, I can tell you stories to cover three generations of strong-willed women, who all were part of Ascension). I started a hunt of great proportion. The harder it was to find information, the more determined I was that their story needed to be uncovered and shared. I used ancestry.com, local obituaries and created family trees for each family that I could for our shared church ancestry.

I had no problem calling strangers on the other side of the country and quickly introducing myself before they hung-up thinking I was a solicitor. It was during all of this that I realized somehow the tide changed. The living became more of the priority. We had visitors coming to our services because their families were being remembered. Our entire church community was engaged and welcoming to them. BTW we do have an amazing, loving church community and for that I am so proud to be a part. People from other states were watching our live-stream services and being part of our weekly service.

An entire energy was created at Ascension. Looking at the calendar, the quilt, the formal tea, people working together to create written records of our church's past, present and future. and the upcoming other events, we have had a wonderful celebratory year.

Their children were baptized from the same font and his family is loved and celebrated. All in a church and community that truly believes that "God Loves you- NO exceptions"

#### **EDUCATION FOR MINISTRY**

If you have a desire to make meaning of your life, to better understand your relationship with God, to uncover your gifts so that you might use them in God's creation, and to be in community with others as you discern your purpose, then consider joining an Education for Ministry (EfM) program. Developed through the University of the South in Sewanee, Tenn., the curriculum for Lay people offers seminary-level education without the burden of tests and grades. It will start in most parishes in September and finish in June, every week for 36 weeks. Currently, it is being offered at 8 parishes around the Diocese. #### **CLARKE MORTENSEN, SEMINARIAN**

This fall, I will be interviewing for the next step of the ordination process which is candidacy for holy orders. (You may remember that my current title is postulant.) On October 10th, I will be at Bellwether Farm (for the first time, as a guest!) and meet with the Commission on Ministry and the Standing Committee. Their job is to make sure I am prepared to move on in the process and make a recommendation to Bishop Anne, though all the final decisions rest with the bishop. The Sunday following my interview, I will be visiting Ascension for the first time since I started seminary! I look forward to seeing all of you during that weekend and worshiping with you.

This step in the process has been shifted forward because the bishop has slightly changed the timeline on which people are being ordained. The traditional model is to graduate seminary, then be ordained as a deacon, and then six months later be ordained as a priest. This works well in some contexts, but in a diocese where most of the jobs are rectors of small parishes, that six-month period of being a deacon can cause problems like still needing to pay supply priests while also having a full-time clergy person. The timeline that the diocese is shifting to is one that has become more common, in which seminarians are ordained as deacons in the winter of their senior year, and then ordained as priests during the summer after graduating. This means that they can gain experience as a deacon while still in school, and then jump straight into a new job as a priest. This means (God willing and the people consenting) that I am on track to be ordained as a deacon next year, in roughly December of 2026, and as a priest in the summer of 2027.

I share all of this with you to give you a window into the ordination process, which can be confusing to those both outside and inside!

Additionally, **we will add to our endowment for Facility Upkeep**, providing long-term financial stability for the ongoing maintenance and preservation of our historic buildings.

To acknowledge your generous support for this project, those who contribute a minimum of \$1,500 to the 150th Legacy Campaign will have their names inscribed on a plaque of honor within the church.

Your contribution of any amount to the Legacy Campaign is an investment in the enduring legacy of Church of the Ascension. ## Introducing a new way to get your Contribution Statement and view the Church Directory via the IconCMO Member Portal

#### What is IconCMO and How Does It Help Our Church?

IconCMO is a database that keeps financial records and member information for our Church. It facilitates the use of this database by Ascension's administrative staff to communicate with parishioners and maintain its financial records using a fund accounting methodology.

#### As a Church member, you can:

- review and edit your own information in the database.
- view and communicate with other church members an online church directory,
- · view or print out your donation statement at any time,
- · and see what groups you are in.

#### Our church staff can:

- edit or view any record based on their security level,
- add donations, pledges, members, groups, and attendance,
- review church accounting books or payroll,
- · communicate via mass email or text messaging to the entire church or certain groups,
- and more...

#### What Do I Need To Get Started?

Please request 'Member Access Credentials' (MAC) from the Church Administrator Jim Weiss Jim.Weiss@ascension-lakewood.org, the Treasurer Rincy Isaacs risaacs@ascension-lakewood.net, or Aaron Beatty aaron@ascension-lakewood.net. This is a required first step.

You will receive an email from the Church Administrator with a clickable link, and your username and temporary password. Please click on the link to login and change your password. You may be required to enter the Church's phone number; if so, type 216-521-8727. You may also change your username to one that you prefer instead of the assigned random number. Save these credentials for future use.

#### **How Do I Access Icon With A Web Browser?**

Go to <u>Icon CMO</u> on your browser. You will need to enter the Church's phone number (216-521-8727) and your saved credentials.

#### Can I Use My Mobile Device?

Yes! Our church members can have access to the church directory at their fingertips. Check out the church software app in the iOS App Store or Google's Play Store below or look up 'iconcmo' in the app store for your device.

After you have received the MAC, open the IconCMO app and log in through the church software app using your credentials

#### Can I See My Own Donations or Print Them?

Yes! No more waiting for donation statements to arrive via pony express mail for tax time. Our church members can print their statements right from the member portal. Our church members can verify that all their donations are recorded by the church instead of waiting until the end of the year. Please note that the donations via Vanco (Credit Card or Debit Card) are updated usually by the 7th of every month for the previous month.

#### What Else Can I Do?

The Member Portal helps church members in many ways to connect to the church and its members. Members are also able to update their own information (except for their picture). This leads to greater reliability of information as congregational members monitor their own profiles. Check out what is available below!
