A Reading from Second Kings

5:1-3, 7-15c

Naaman, a general for the king of Aram, was a great man and highly regarded by his master, because through him the Lord had given victory to Aram. This man was a mighty warrior, but he had a skin disease. Now Aramean raiding parties had gone out and captured a young girl from the land of Israel. She served Naaman's wife.

She said to her mistress, "I wish that my master could come before the prophet who lives in Samaria. He would cure him of his skin disease."

When the king of Israel read the letter, he ripped his clothes. He said, "What? Am I God to hand out death and life? But this king writes me, asking me to cure someone of his skin disease! You must realize that he wants to start a fight with me."

When Elisha the man of God heard that Israel's king had ripped his clothes, he sent word to the king: "Why did you rip your clothes? Let the man come to me. Then he'll know that there's a prophet in Israel."

Naaman arrived with his horses and chariots. He stopped at the door of Elisha's house. Elisha sent out a messenger who said, "Go and wash seven times in the Jordan River. Then your skin will be restored and become clean."

But Naaman went away in anger. He said, "I thought for sure that he'd come out, stand and call on the name of the Lord his God, wave his hand over the bad spot, and cure the skin disease. Aren't the rivers in Damascus, the Abana and the Pharpar, better than all Israel's waters? Couldn't I wash in them and get clean?" So he turned away and proceeded to leave in anger.

Naaman's servants came up to him and spoke to him: "Our father, if the prophet had told you to do something difficult, wouldn't you have done it? All he said to you was, 'Wash and become clean." So Naaman went down and bathed in the Jordan seven times, just as the man of God had said. His skin was restored like that of a young boy, and he became clean.

He returned to the man of God with all his attendants. He came and stood before Elisha, saying, "Now I know for certain that there's no God anywhere on earth except in Israel."

Remember Jesus Christ, who was raised from the dead and descended from David. This is my good news. This is the reason I'm suffering to the point that I'm in prison like a common criminal. But God's word cannot be imprisoned. This is why I endure everything for the sake of those who are chosen by God so that they too may experience salvation in Christ Jesus with eternal glory. This saying is reliable:

"If we have died together, we will also live together.

If we endure, we will also rule together.

If we deny him, he will also deny us.

If we are disloyal, he stays faithful"

because he can't be anything else than what he is.

Remind them of these things and warn them in the sight of God not to engage in battles over words that aren't helpful and only destroy those who hear them. Make an effort to present yourself to God as a tried-and-true worker, who doesn't need to be ashamed but is one who interprets the message of truth correctly.

"The Creeds are statements of our basic beliefs about God" (BCP 851).

We say these words as a gathered community to affirm our belief in God as creator, redeemer, and sustainer of all creation, as the source of life and holiness. God has blessed humanity with relationships and community which are part of God's own essence as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. We do not say these words as some sort of litmus test but as an invitation to wrestle with the mystery and complexity of God with generations of Christians who have gone before us and with generations who will come after us.

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen. We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ,
the only Son of God,
eternally begotten of the Father,
God from God, Light from Light,
true God from true God,
begotten, not made,
of one Being with the Father.
Through him all things were made.
For us and for our salvation
he came down from heaven:
was incarnate of the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary,
and became truly human.
For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate;
he suffered death and was buried.

he ascended into heaven
and is seated at the right hand of the Father.
He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead,
and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father,

Remembering Past Parishioners Celebrating 150 years of ministry 1875 – 2025

Orissa Fidelia Plimpton (1835-1900) James A. Kidney (1832-1912)



Orissa F. Plimpton was born March 28, 1835, in Lakewood, Ohio to Jonathan and Malone Plimpton.

James Kidney was born in 1832 in Saratoga, New York to Chaucey and Sarah Kidney.

James and Orissa married on January 1, 1861, in Roaring Creek, Wisconsin. They never had children.

During the Civil War, James Kidney is found in registration records listed as a farmer in Rockport, Ohio. James also worked for a time in Cleveland for the department store Fries and Schuele. Both James and Orissa came from old Lakewood families, families that were pioneers in the early days of Rockport. They both had ancestors who were buried in the old Kidney Cemetery and Wagar Cemetery here in Lakewood, of which both were destroyed to make room for a growing community. Their ancestors were later re-interred in Lakewood Park Cemetery in mass graves. In Lakewood, Orissa and James were known for buying and selling real estate especially near the Nicholson farm.

James A. Kidney and his wife pledged fifty dollars towards the building of Church of the Ascension in 1875. Beforehand, they were part of a group in the community who would conduct prayer groups in the homes of the Hird, Nicholson, Newman and other families.

James A. Kidney is found in the records for Church of the Ascension first in 1892 as a member of vestry and as a Junior Warden that year. James continued to serve on vestry many years in the 1890s.

Orissa was active in the Ladies Guild. Her name is found with many other women who worked tirelessly to provide the funds for the first rectory, which was built in 1898. She was involved in a variety of fundraisers, and her recipes live on in our archives and were recently published in our 2025 collection of recipes and histories. "During her lifetime she endeared herself to all who knew her by thoughtful kindness for others and her endeavors to lighten the load of those who were in need".

Orissa Plimpton Kidney passed away on June 23, 1900, and was buried at Woodland Cemetery in Cleveland. Her funeral services were on June 26, 1900, and were officiated by Rev. William Sheppard at Church of the Ascension. James Kidney passed away on September 28, 1912, in Painesville, Ohio. His funeral service was at Church of the Ascension on October 2, 1912, and was officiated by Rev. George F. Williams.
